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Churches for Middle East Peace (CMEP) Mourns the Passing of His Holiness Pope Francis

Washington, D.C. – April 22, 2025, Churches for Middle East Peace (CMEP) joins millions of people around the world in mourning the passing of His Holiness Pope Francis. We grieve the profound loss of a stalwart leader of the Christian faith—one whose moral clarity, deep compassion, and unrelenting pursuit of justice marked a generation.

Pope Francis was a tireless advocate for human dignity. He championed the rights of the poor, the marginalized, and the oppressed. He spoke boldly on behalf of refugees and displaced peoples, challenged global leaders to address the climate crisis, and insisted on the equal worth and rights of all people. His unwavering commitment to interfaith dialogue and peacebuilding reshaped the Church's witness in the modern world.

Even in his final days, Pope Francis continued to embody the radical love and humility of Christ. Until the very end of his life, he remained in daily contact with the Christian community in Gaza, offering pastoral care and solidarity amidst unimaginable suffering. He called persistently for an end to the war in Gaza, reminding the global community of our shared humanity and our sacred responsibility to protect life. Pope Francis urged us—again and again—to love one another. He challenged the Church not to turn inward, but to go to the margins. He reminded us that peace is possible, but only through justice, mercy, and courageous action.

Rev. Dr. Mae Elise Cannon, Executive Director of CMEP, reflects: "Pope Francis lived out the Good News of the Gospel in word and deed. His voice for justice and compassion was a beacon in a world so often divided by violence and fear. We mourn his passing with deep sorrow and deep gratitude for his extraordinary legacy."

CMEP will continue to honor Pope Francis' vision by advancing our mission to pursue peace, advocate for justice, and uphold the dignity of all people in the Middle East.

egregious violations of religious freedom and amplifying the statement by the Orthodox Patriarchate of Jerusalem on the assaults against worshippers during Holy Fire Saturday.

Apr 18, 2025 Humanitarian Snapshot #11

Churches for Middle East Peace (CMEP) joins 26 humanitarian aid and advocacy groups to shed light on the besieged state of Gaza and the West Bank. No aid has been allowed to enter Gaza in over six weeks. Increased military operations in the West Bank have displaced over 40,000 people, destroyed countless homes and businesses, and disrupted the flow of aid. The UN Secretary General referred to Gaza as an "endless death loop". Along with a report detailing the conditions in Gaza and the West Bank, this snapshot calls for an immediate and permanent ceasefire.

<u>Apr 17, 2025 CMEP Executive Director Leads Delegation in Jordan for High-Level</u> <u>Religious and Diplomatic Meetings</u>

Churches for Middle East Peace (CMEP) executive director, Rev. Dr. Mae Elise Cannon, led a small interfaith delegation of Christian and Muslim leaders to Jordan between April 9-10, 2025. His Excellency Bishop Mpumlwana Malusi, the former General Secretary of the South African Council of Churches (SACC), and Imam Dr. Yahya Hendi, Director of Muslim Life at Georgetown University, joined Rev. Dr. Cannon as they met with high-level political and religious leaders to discuss the most recent events in the region with an emphasis on what can be done to end the war on Gaza. In addition to meeting with Deputy Prime Minister Safadi and other leaders, the delegation was honored to participate in a gathering with the Nobel Women's Initiative hosted by His Royal Highness Prince El Hassan bin Talal.

<u>Apr 13, 2025 CMEP condemns bombing of Al-Ahli Hospital and demands</u> <u>Protection for the Christian Community and all in Gaza</u>

CMEP condemns in the strongest possible terms the bombing of Al-Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza. Al-Ahli is an Anglican institution and one of the oldest, continuously operating hospitals in Gaza. It is Gaza's only Christian hospital and its only cancer treatment center. The bombing of the Anglican Al-Ahli Arab Hospital is a violation of the sacredness of life and it is especially abhorrent during this sacred time for Christians.
